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

amongst their peers.












Other characteristics are building **trust** between the members, focusing on **improving** and **innovating** their practices, coming up with objectives and temporary **goals**, meaning that when the goal is achieved the CoP can disband. The room in which this happens can be in the physical or on online platforms.

Specific Activities must be of common interest and are linked to the community's purpose such as:

- Solving problems
- The innovation of practices
- Sharing and building knowledge
- Looking for experience under the motto of learning by doing
- Identification and use of potential (in the group and outside, other relevant stakeholders)
- Identifying and coordinating synergies
- Developing and facilitating reflections and discussions
- If applicable, visits can be part of the CoP agenda
- Knowledge mapping and gap identification





Introduction of CCOP

Community of Practice groups were formed and requested € 50.000 under Linking and Learning according with the memo of EURO 50K. This fund is to support joint grantee partner follow-up activities, born from their participation in Voice linking and learning processes and events. To realize and build upon ideas and actions that emerged from their interaction. Therefore, it must always be a request from at least two or more grantees. This is a beautiful opportunity to respond to the request of grantee partners and rightsholder groups to take an issue of joint concern further, to learn together, and to deepen their knowledge on a certain topic or other. Activities could be about inclusion, collaboration, joint learning, or innovations in empowerment, influencing or amplification.









Voice Team, Voice/Oxfam Linking and Learning Facilitator Team, by Live & Learn Cambodia

Live and Learn Cambodia (LLC) takes a role in facilitating this practice with support from its CoP members. That specifically means taking on issues of mutual concern further, to learn together, and deepen our knowledge on a particular topic or others among CoPs. Moreover, it includes driving deeper inclusion, collaboration, joint learning, or innovations in empowerment, influencing, or amplification.



There is a committee that assess and approve the CoP's proposals and budgets. During consultation workshops and online assessments the committee supported all the CoP's and help move the CoP's work in Cambodia.

Budget Management by Linking and Learning, Live & Learn Cambodia's Policy:

Option 1: Request for project expenses made by the Linking and Learning Facilitator team by following the Live & Learn Cambodia (LLC) policy.

Option 2: Request for project expenses made by CoP representative, including request of advance and clearance. If the CoP chooses option 2, the CoP will need to sign an MoU and other requirements for the financial management.

Inspired by the "Linking Toward Inclusive Community of Practice" event, in which more than 17 granteespartners and rights holders joined, we revisited the idea of how we can do better together in addressing issues that marginalized communities are facing.



Annual Linking and Learning Reflection in Siem Reap. From March 21st to 23rd, 2023, 15 grantee partners and rightsholder groups gathered for the annual linking & learning event organized by Live & Learn Cambodia. The event aimed to enhance collaboration and engagement among all partners to boost the initiative proposal for the grant of EUR 50K. The three-day event featured various interactive activities, including a Community of Practice discussion to speed up the process and encourage grantees to initiate ideas quickly. The five CoP groups - Indigenous People, Women facing exploitation, abuse, violence, People with disabilities, Youth and elderly people, and LGBTIQ+ - actively participated in team discussions to exchange individual project implementation practices and explore innovative, creative, and inclusive solutions. L&L also encouraged grantees to reflect on their existing groups and how they could be improved in terms of working and group structure. The platform served its purpose well, helping activate and promote dialogue among the five CoP groups to initiate ideas or develop joint proposals for the grant of EUR 50K.






The Linking and Learning Team of Live and Learn Cambodia has conducted many capacity-strengthening sessions with grantee partners to support their project implementation and journey as an organization. With additional resource support to implement linking and learning activities among grantee partners, CoPs became more alive and allowed grantee partners to develop and pitch new, collaborative ideas. This is a beautiful opportunity to respond to the request of grantee partners and rightsholder groups to take on collective issues, learn together, and deepen their knowledge on specific topics.


Through the project cycle management training, CoP women have devised an initiative to explore real CoP work in Cambodia to prototype the first CoP work in 2023.

To help the CoPs develop their project ideas, the Linking and Learning Team provided two consultation workshops to help them develop project proposals and connect with relevant stakeholders who are working around inclusion and amplifying the voices of the marginalized. The first consultation workshop was held from the 8th to the 10th of November, 2023. The aim was to convey knowledge about project proposals, define vital activities, and develop budget plans. Engaging with relevant stakeholders was also essential for CoP to explore the opportunities and ideas around the CoP's work.



The second consultation workshop was held for three days (13-15 December 2023). The consultation followed the previous one to support the 3 CoP groups with 10 members to complete their CoP project proposal and budget plan. The workshop covered two main aspects. The policies and procedures on the financial management of the CoP proposed projects and the practical work on developing the project proposal, budget plan, and draft agenda of each primary activity.





X CoP-LGBTQIA+ People

Project ideas - Unfolding LGBTIQ+ journey: *embracing diversity, equality, and inclusion*

The public's awareness of the challenges faced by LGBT couples and individuals is lacking. This project aims to bridge this gap by capturing heartwarming documentary videos that celebrates the power of love, acceptance, and the power of love to overcome even the toughest obstacles. The stories follow a beautiful LGBTI couple as they navigate life together, facing the challenges and triumphs of being true to oneself and the power of love from their families. The project will feature resilience, courage, and unwavering commitment to each other, leaving audiences moved and inspired. The project is a bold step towards creating a society that embraces diversity, inclusion, and equality by documenting the real-life experience of LGBTIQ+ couples, celebrating Month of Love (February) by documenting families and their LGBTIQ+ children through acceptance stories, and raising awareness about the LGBTIQ situation and rights to the public. It also highlights the challenges faced by LGBTIQ couples, especially in Cambodia, where there is no legal marriage for LGBTIQ couples.

CoP-Women

Project Ideas - Women's Voice towards Inclusive:

The intersectionality rightsholder group in communities often lacks access to ID-Poor cards and health equity fund cards, hindering their ability to access information, education, and social activities. They also face trauma from domestic violence and abuse, which can be emotional, physical, or economic. The community lacks access to sign language and social support for deaf individuals. Phase II of the project, linked to Phase I of CoP Women, aims to promote sign language in remote areas like Rattanakiri province, increase the capacity of five rightsholder groups with knowledge related to sign language, empower them to raise their voice through campaigns, and eliminate identity stigma and discrimination by gaining support from authorities to access public services. The project aims to address these issues and promote a more inclusive society for all.

CoP-Disability Identity Card

Project Ideas - Researching disability identity card (DIC)

The Disability Identification Card (DIC) is a vital tool for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) to improve their quality of life and represent the government's recognition of their disabilities. It also aids in estimating the number of PWDs and adapting policies accordingly. However, many individuals face challenges accessing the ID card, including lack of knowledge, complexities in the application process, and lack of guidance. The reasons for these difficulties vary depending on the province of residence. To address these issues, a comprehensive study involving various stakeholders is proposed. The study will involve the LGBTQ community, seniors, minorities, and women, and will be conducted by a CoP. The findings will be shared with the grantee and rightsholder, as part of a linking and learning event in Kompot province. By identifying the exact causes of these difficulties, practical solutions can be developed to improve the quality of life for a significant portion of the population.

Project Ideas - Paint Your Emotion:

Hearing impairment individuals struggle with mental health due to difficulties in expressing and relaxing their emotions, leading to a loss of dreams, courage, and social participation. Sign Language and Arts and Mental Health aims to provide workshops to help deaf individuals learn new ways to express emotions, relax, and manage stress, promoting better mental health. Deaf people can learn to draw, practice, and understand that drawing is an easy way to express emotions and relieve stress. This can help them feel like sharing or spreading out, even if they can't tell anyone.

CoP - Elderly & People with disability ←

Project Ideas- "Amplify the Voice of Community through Theatre" "MOTHER"

The elderly and individuals living with a disability often face barriers in participating in various activities due to illness, disabilities, and lack of understanding of the law. They also struggle with limited access to social services, especially for those with disabilities living in severe poverty. They lack information about social assistance and protection programs and lack publicity and inclusive facilities. To address these issues, CoP of people with disabilities and older people used community theater to voice their concerns. Community theater aims to bring the stories of vulnerable people's vulnerabilities to the public audience, allowing stakeholders to hear and respond to their issues.

Project Ideas - Amplifying the voice of the Kui indigenous community through an Opera theatrical performance "Yike"

CoP IP has a co-initiative on amplifying the IP identity, especially on language through theatrical performances and multimedia. The project aims to promote and enhance the Kui people's indigenous language identity through theatrical performances, especially the Kui language. Performing arts is an innovative and creative approach to reflect the importance of language in community communication and encourage the next generation of Kuy youth to learn, understand, and speak the Kuy language in the community with louder and prouder. This is exciting as they will work with IP youth on stories and reflection on their crucial learning. This project is jointly implemented by IP grantee partners

29th October 2023, Rattanakiri Province

This was the first CoP-Women workshop that was conducted by the AVR Users Association (AUA), Women Peace Maker (WPM), Lakhon Komnit Organization (LKO), Conserve Indigenous Peoples Languages Organization (CIPL) and Women with Disabilities Leadership and Advocacy Network (WWD-LAN). The workshop aimed to create a safe space for rights holder groups, reduce stigma and discrimination against them and collaborate to address common concerns of the rights holders. Representatives from each rights holder group voiced their experiences and made everyone present aware of each other's humanity. Participants left the training with the courage to raise their voice in unity to advocate for their rights.

"Linking and Learning Event for Freedom, Equality, and Freedom from Discrimination"

11th - 12th December 2023, Rattanakiri Province

Following the success of the first activity the CoP-Women team conducted their second workshop with the aim to put an end to discrimination through joining hands with various stakeholders. The main objective of the event was to provide the opportunity for the five rightsholder groups to meet and connect closely with diverse stakeholders by sharing their respective stories and challenges. After taking part in CoP-Women events twice, participants came to the realization that they are not alone on this path. They feel seen, heard and empowered. All of them requested the team to host more events like this since they are eager to participate and contribute in the effort to eradicate identity-based discrimination.

After my pregnancy I went to a hospital in Kampong Chhnang and felt down when I found out that I have HIV. I was discriminated against by my relatives and family. My son also killed himself because of the discrimination. I urge everyone to not discriminate people living with HIV anymore.

25th - 26th February 2024, Rattanakiri Province

In this workshop the CoP-Women introduced their new member: Cambodian sign language. The purpose of this very engaging meeting was to spread more awareness about the deaf community and their sign language. Promoting sign language in the community, especially in remote areas like Rattanakiri province, where no institution or NGO has a deaf development program is very important to the CoP-Women. The days were filled with informative presentations about inclusive language, facts about sign language and deaf people and/or people with hearing impairments. Deaf people shared their own experiences and were involved in teaching basic sign language to the participants. The lessons on sign language were very engaging and playful and left everyone excited to learn more. Overall, the workshop was a valuable experience for everyone involved, and the participants left with a newfound sense of empowerment and hope for a more inclusive future.

"Organize amplify campaign for celebrate the International Women's Day"

5th February 2024, Rattanakiri Province

The event highlights the diversity of five communities and highlights the challenges faced by each group. Local authorities play a crucial role in supporting and maintaining the system. Around 89 participants, including women living with HIV, LGBT, elderly, and disabled people, participated in the campaign. The event was attended by representatives from the National AIDS Authority, Ratanakkiri Provincial Hall, Department of Women's Affairs, Department of Health, Ratanakkiri Provincial Department of Social Affairs, and target groups such as HIV, disabled, elderly, LGBT, indigenous people, and less young students. The program was held at Banlung City Kindergarten and participants were encouraged to match up with passers-by on the street.



"Amplifying the Kui Indigenous identity through theatrical performance and multimedia"

January - March 2024, Kompong Thom

The performance on March 8, 2024, was a landmark event in this project, drawing over a thousand participants from the Kui and other communities. This event showcased the results of the intensive training program, where indigenous youth performed a Khmer Opera in their native Kui language. The stories performed were rooted in the Kui community's heritage, reflecting their traditions and current societal challenges. Playing traditional games further enriched the experience of participants, making it an educational and celebratory event. Reflecting on the project's journey it's evident that the challenges of tight timelines and rigorous training schedules were met with unprecedented community support and dedication. This event was a vivid illustration of the power of the arts in promoting cultural identity and community solidarity, marking a significant step forward in the ongoing efforts to preserve the cultural heritage of the Kui people.



"Amplify the Voice of Community through Theatre" "MOTHER"

1st - 2nd of March 2024, Battambang

At 2pm, the event forum theater to amplify the voices of the community started. 15 performers consisting of elderly people, women who suffered from domestic violence and people with disabilities, did their best to convey the struggles of their life and people like them. In the audience were local authorities, stakeholders and many more who felt empowered after witnessing the performances. Listening to these stories with empathy and care encouraged everyone to find solutions to more effectively access appropriate public services for them. All in all, the first CoP-PwD & Elderly (WWD-LAN, LKO, OPA, HAC) event found success in raising awareness about the challenges and appropriated needs of people with disabilities and elderly people through a theatrical performance based on real stories.



"Unfolding LGBTIQ+ Journey: Embracing Diversity, Equality, and Inclusion!"

February - May 2024, Phnom Penh

To celebrate IDAHOT this year LiD in collaboration with Women Peace Makers organized a film screening event. The program contained a touching storytelling of a lesbian woman and three videos of LGBTQIA+ couples. The videos documented a relationships between a woman and a transman and all of them had a different story to tell. In between the video screening the audience got to enjoy two live lipsyncing performances by two individuals of the LGBTQIA+ community. After each video screening participants shared their thoughts and appreciation for the program. The evening ended with an engaging Kahoot quizz and a lucky-draw game with 10 lucky winners.



Researching disability identity card (DIC)

January - May 2024

The DIC is predominantly known by individuals identifying as having a disability. However, knowledge remains limited regarding the utility of this card and the means of obtaining it. Therefore, only a minority of the respondents owe a DIC.

Geographical area and type of disability have a significant impact on access to the DIC.

People with disabilities who registered mentioned very few difficulties in the registration process. However, some improvements can be implemented.

Local authorities are fulfilling their role in providing information and registration. Nevertheless, the methods used could benefit from diversification to promote greater awareness among people with disabilities.

Schools are largely unaware of the existence of the DIC. However, they could play a key role in the dissemination of information and follow-up for people with disabilities.

NGOs play a significant role in educating and assisting people with disabilities in registering for the Disability Identification Card (DIC). Better coordination with schools and local authorities would facilitate the registration of individuals.

Paint Your Emotion

May 26 2024, Phnom Penh

The workshop started by everyone getting to know each other to allow everyone to feel safe, connected, and comfortable. During the workshop, the participants Learn about the art of painting, how to draw, and how to practice drawing by understanding the basics of holding a pencil and brush for painting and drawing, using colors, and mixing colors. Understand the relationship between painting and emotion, and practice drawing by learning to connect emotions with colors and images and express that emotion with coloring using colors that are meaningful in line with the emotions you want to express.

At the end of the workshop, the participants can connect their feelings to art and put their emotions into their paintings by using different colors to express their emotions on the paper.

We believe that deaf people obtain another tool to put their minds or emotions that cannot be expressed in words into painting or drawing. That will eventually help them to feel relieved and hopeful.






